ORGANIZATION

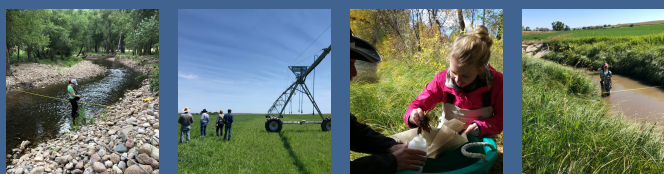

FUNDING

SCCD is funded primarily through federal and state grants with some support from local funding sources, including contributions from private citizens. Funds raised through private contributions are critical to the function of the SCCD. Local funds serve as match for grants and provide for activities not covered through grants. Funding received from local sources enables SCCD to maintain its commitment to local resource management.

Thanks to support from Sheridan County, the City of Sheridan, the Towns of Dayton, Ranchester, and Clearmont, and contributions from private citizens, SCCD has been able to help this community since its formation in 1972. Year after year, the majority of SCCD's budget goes towards on-the-ground projects aimed at improving water and land quality in Sheridan County.

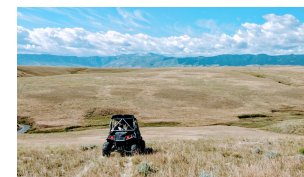
Acme Power Plant Reclamation Project
